Voting Instructions and Establishment of Quorum

Article 2.2 (c) "Quorum"- A quorum for the Annual General Meeting of the corporation and for transactions of any business at such meetings shall be not less than (11) corporation members including voting members of the board of directors.

A 51% majority vote of eligible voters present at an AGM shall be required to approve any business transaction. I confirm that under the constitution and bylaws of the North Bay MFRC, we have a quorum and I declare the Annual General Meeting of members properly constituted.

Article 2.2 (g) "Voting Entitlement" – Each full member and member of the board present at an Annual General Meeting shall be entitled to one (1) vote per motion. Voting at an Annual General Meeting shall be by full members in good standing. The chair of the Annual General Meeting is not entitled to vote on matters being considered unless there is a tied vote. No voting by proxy will be permitted.

ON THE ITEMS THAT REQUIRE A VOTE:

- A motion is made by a member who has obtained the floor;
- · It then requires a second;
- The motion will then be open for discussion;
- The motion will be re-stated, and finally;
- · It will be put to a vote.



- relentless separation


Relocation



Concluded 5 years as a Director on Chamber of Commerce Board in Dec 2022





Donat Roussy Business Manager, Information & Referral and Employment Services

- Provided Employment Services virtually and in person.
- Developed partnerships with the MFRC Employment Coordinator's Network, a national initiative developed by Military Family Services (MFS)
- Member of the Nipissing Employment Services Table Committee (NEST). This committee is comprised of a variety of community stakeholders.
- Participated on the Labour Market Groups Workforce Week Planning Committee for the sixth year in a row. This committee is responsible for planning various events throughout the district of Nipissing. These events include: Job Preparedness Day "Get Job Ready", the North Bay Job Fair "Bay Works" and an Employment Service Provider Showcase.

Francesca Alexanian **Child Care Navigator**

 During this past fiscal year, a proposal was written to expand the infant room in the Little Wings Child Care Centre (LWCC). We are currently waiting for funding approval for this project. However, if it is funded LWCC would have the ability to increase their infant room from the three spaces currently available to 10 infant spaces. This building would allow LWCC to support the growing need military families have for infant care, as well as our USAF counterparts who have limited parental leave.





Shannon Mason Personal Enrichment Program

- The Personal Enrichment program offers specific programming tailored to the needs of the Military Member and Military Spouses. The different programs focus on networking, self-care, mindfulness and camaraderie. There are weekly, monthly and special occasion events that individuals can choose to be a part of.
- Our programs include Coffee Connections, Just For Us and Spouses Night Out.
- Some special events that took place over the past year which brought out a number of new spouses where: Community Fun Day, Military Family Appreciation Day, MFRC Meet & Greet, Paint Party, Halloween Haunted Hike, Christmas Party, Spring Tea Party, Hike at Duchesnay Falls and Horseback Riding at Von Doehler's Ranch that ended the season.

Shara Hicks Little Wings Childcare Centre

- 2022 continued to be a challenge for our childcare centre. Little Wings is still feeling the effects the pandemic had on the whole childcare sector, and staffing remains a challenge. With significant staff vacancies and difficulty finding qualified staff, it has at times been difficult to keep the doors open. Shara and her team prevailed in maintaining our operations, and our children are resilient!
- Little Wings is proud to have opted into the Canada Wide Early Learning Child Care Agreement, which has shown a substantial reduction in fees for families and will be moving towards \$10/day childcare for children under 6 in the coming years.

Diane Sarrazin-Dubeau Deployment, Parent Support, Second Language and Welcome Services

- Deployment We are supporting approximately 68 families experiencing a family separation due to either a tasking or deployment. 166 Warm Line Calls were made throughout the year to families living in our catchment area. All families enjoy being able to send parcels to loved ones, total shipped parcels was 62. We sent out special occasion parcels 4 times last fiscal to 22 Wing members.
- **Parent Support** We supported families in many ways through our weekly Playgroups, Self-Regulation and Triple P support programs. New resources were added to our library on topics such as children's Covid themed books, anxiety, stress, and self regulation. One on one support helped families build their skills and help relieve their anxiety. We hosted 45 weekly Child Parent Playgroup sessions in partnership with the Early On Program. In total, 21 families (37 children) participated in the program.
- Second Language Training Overall, we saw an increase in interest in our Second Language training program offering Rosetta Stone online programming and the LRDG French course. 16 students enhanced their language skills Through the 3 LRDG sessions for a total of 22 classes.

Shannon Mason Child, Youth and Teen Programs

- The Child, Youth and Teen Programs offer military children the chance to connect with their peers while working on their communication, social skills and have fun while doing it. Our MindMasters program was a success. During the 7 week session participants learned some relaxation, positive thinking and mindfulness based techniques.
- Youth Night Kicked off in January. The last Saturday of every month we did activities such as diamond dot, painting, games night and video game competition.
- Other special events and activities that took place over the course of the year were: 22 Wing At-Home Easter Scavenger Hunt and Colouring Contest, Summer Fun Kits, Halloween Costume Contest, Jingle on A Sleigh, Teen Centre Virtual Easter Scavenger Hunt, Baking Kit Bake Off and the Gingerbread House Showcase

Carrie Gray Veteran Family Program

- In the Spring of 2022, The VFP welcomed Lauren Anglin to the program! Lauren was a welcomed addition who brought new ideas and great energy.
- As Covid eased, the VFP was once again able to hit the road to reach our many outlying areas. It was wonderful to attend Sudbury, Timmins and Sault Ste. Marie to re-connect and commemorate Veteran Family Day in these locations!
- After a 2 year prompted break, Carrie was able to return her volunteer work at Camp Maple Leaf for the Kids of Heroes Week, as an integral part of their social work team, providing programming, and support for campers and staff.







Lindsay MacLean Family Liaison Officer, Social Worker Prevention, Support & Intervention

The position is located within both the Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC) and the Transition Centre (TC). The objective of having the service available in both centres is to connect these Centres as an assurance that the widest variety of support is offered to families of Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) personnel who are coping with an illness, injury, special and the families of the fallen.

In this position I was familiar with the challenges that the families of ill/injured CAF personnel face as my spouse was injured in Afghanistan and received a medical release.

My knowledge in stress-based interventions, grief and bereavement facilitation and operational stress injury psychoeducation provided me with the ability to serve this community. I connected with peers from all around our catchment area as most of the population seemed to be receptive to virtual services.

I worked closely with the Operational Stress Injury Social Support Program and the North Bay Indigenous Friendship Centre to explore alternative healing methods to bring to this population. I hope to see this momentum continue after my departure to expand the support available to this community from our partner agencies.

I loved my time at the North Bay MFRC and my supervisors were warm and supportive of my work to enhance the Family Liaison Officer Program.











Special Notes

2.11 Quorum: (For AGM or Special Meetings) Updated to reflect wording from previous Constitution and Bylaws which was more clear:

The quorum for the AGM and the Special General meetings shall be held by simple majority of those in attendance.

Updated to:

A quorum for the Annual General Meeting of the corporation and for transactions of any business at such meetings shall be not less than (11) corporation members including voting members of the board of directors.

A 51% majority vote of eligible voters present at an AGM shall be required to approve any business transaction. I confirm that under the constitution and bylaws of the North Bay MFRC, we have a quorum and I declare the Annual General Meeting of members properly constituted.

3.13b Location of meetings

Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held within the Province of Ontario.

Updated to:

Meetings of the of the board of directors must be held within Ontario at a place that the directors determine. A meeting of the corporation may be held at a place outside Ontario if all the directors entitled to vote at the meeting agree that the meeting is to be held at that place.
